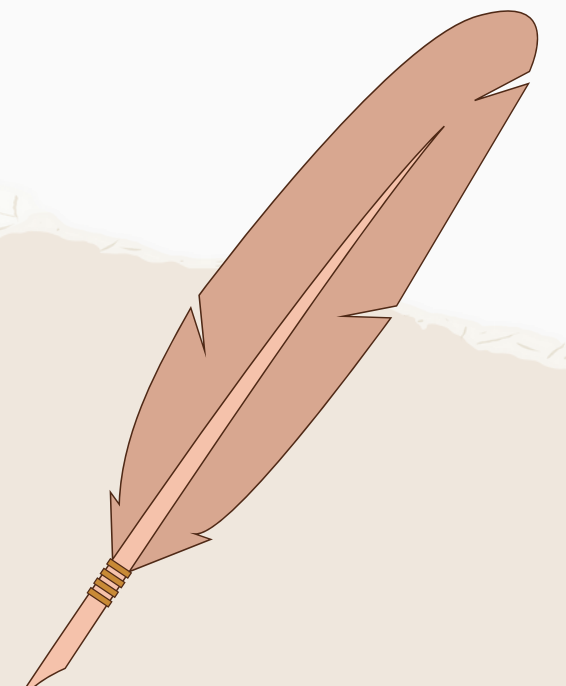
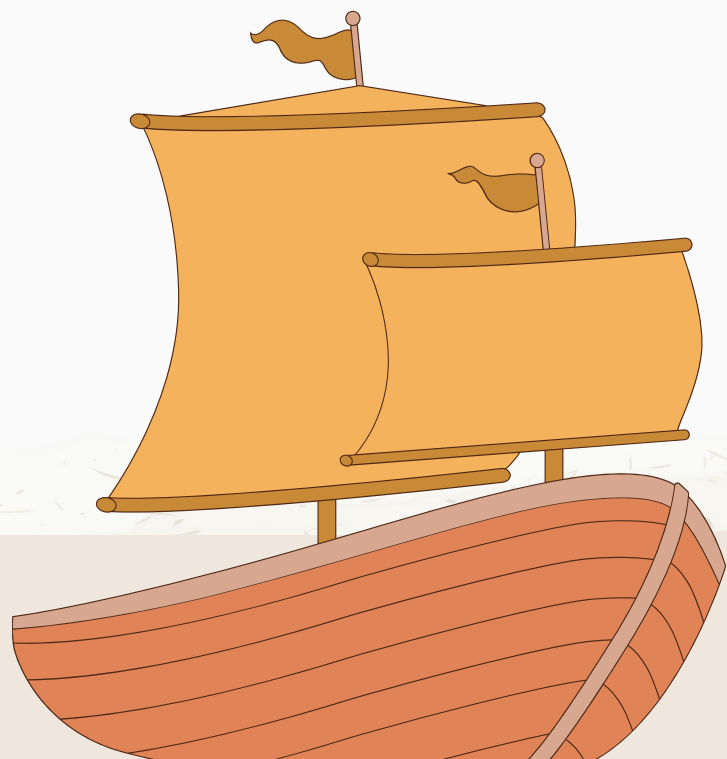

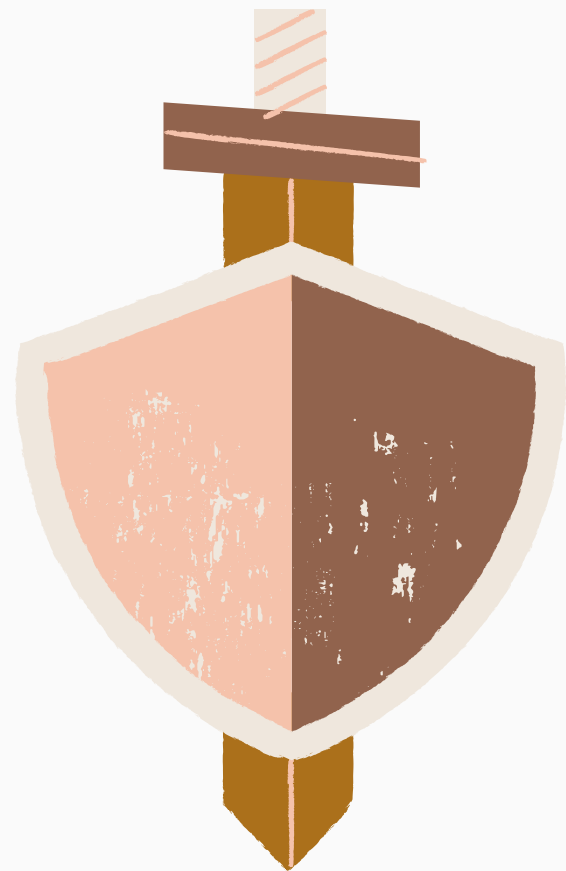

DEEPER DIVE



Teaching effectively using primary sources does not have to be a practice reserved for only higher education students. You can employ the same practices for social studies and history classes at all grade levels.

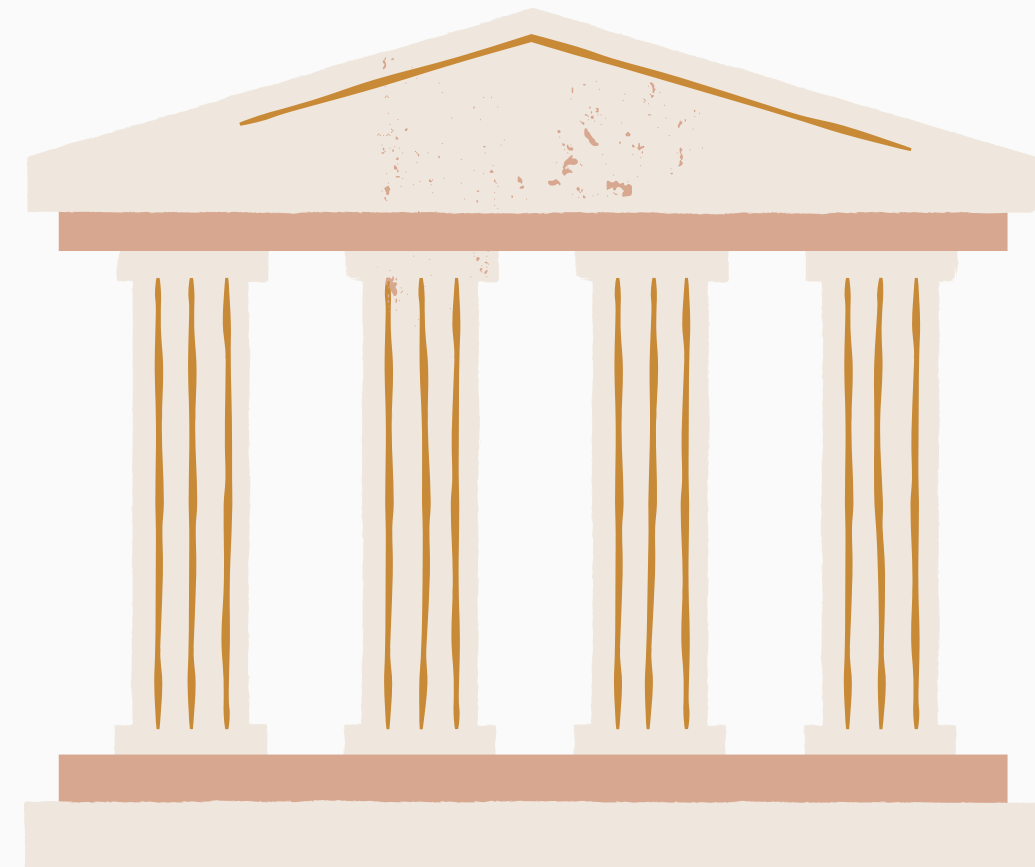
The slow down approach by asking students to spend time answering a series of questions while examining a primary source object provides a deeper understanding of a historical event, person, or time period. Our approach at UGA's Special Collections is modeled after the TeachArchives.org project and used in middle, high, undergraduate, and graduate level classes.

OUTREACH WITH SCL

We offer free field trips that are curriculum based for all grade levels. We make efforts each year to connect with schools where their grade standards are well aligned with our current exhibits on display. In addition, we are always open to host interested groups from all over or we can visit your school in person.

In the last year, we partnered with our local Escape the Space to create a game that takes visitors through all three galleries, solving puzzles and gathering clues.
